VANCOUVER

Vancouver Cherry Blossom Festival

The annual Vancouver Cherry Blossom Festival sees a calendar of events take place such as bike rides, cherry blossom viewing tours and arts events.

Drop by the Shipyards Night Market

This free Friday night market is home to more than 120 vendors selling fresh food, a beer garden serving local craft beer and live music showcasing British Columbia's (BC) top talent. The Shipyards Night Market has frequently been voted as one of the best outdoor events in the city.

See whales congregate in the Strait of Georgia

A great thing to do in spring is to go on a whale watching excursion from Vancouver to the Gulf Islands region. You can see killer whales, porpoises, sea lions, seals, bald eagles and other wildlife.

Experience the thrill of the Vancouver International Auto Show

The Vancouver International Auto Show is Western Canada's biggest car show where you can see iconic sports cars and the latest vehicles being released. Soon celebrating its 100th anniversary, this year's show will kick off with a procession through the city and will feature vehicles from each decade of the show.

Eat BC's most famous seafood at the Spot Prawn Festival

The Spot Prawn Festival celebrates the start of the spot prawn season in BC's coastal waters and it educates diners about this local delicacy. Restaurants across the Lower Mainland will put on special menus during the season.

Bridges Restaurant

A landmark restaurant in Vancouver since 1980, Bridges Restaurant is the place to be for seafood and fish but its menu also features fresh meats and local produce.

THINGS TO SEE AND DO IN YUKON

Watch the Northern Lights in early spring

The Yukon is one of the best places in Canada to watch the Northern Lights. The top regions in Yukon to watch them include Campbell, Klondike, Kluane, Watson Lake and just outside the capital city, Whitehorse.

Yukon Wildlife Preserve

At the Yukon Wildlife Preserve, you can see more than 12 iconic Yukon species either on foot via a three-mile loop or on a guided bus tour. Keep your eyes peeled for moose, Canadian lynx and more.

Go hiking and explore Gold Rush ruins and an alpine paradise

Yukon is an adventurer's wonderland, home to Canada's tallest mountains and the world's largest non-polar icefield. It is also a great place to go hiking, with the Slim River West and Chilkoot trails popular routes.

Relax at Takhini Hot Pools

People have been coming for a soak in the Takhini Hot Pools for over 100 years. The hot springs are a relaxing 36°C and 42°C and the water is renowned for its therapeutic qualities.



RESTAURANTS/FOODS TO TRY IN YUKON

Klondike Rib & Salmon

Housed in two of the oldest buildings in Whitehorse, Klondike Rib & Salmon specialises in serving local foods such as wild game meats and home-made breads.

Antoinette's

Antoinette's is a mix of international cuisine with some Caribbean inspiration. The popular restaurant aims to create varied and interesting cultural recipes by using authentic ingredients in its dishes.

Alpine Bakery

One of the oldest eateries in Whitehorse, the Alpine Bakery is much more than just a bakery, also home to a cosy café serving fresh foods like pizzas and soups.

DID YOU KNOW?

The name 'Yukon' originated from the Gwich'in native word, "Yuk-un-ah" meaning "Great River". This refers to the Yukon River which flows across the territory.

Whitehorse was named the capital of the Yukon Territory in 1953. It was previously Dawson City.

The Yukon Territory is roughly the size of Spain, stretching across over 483,000 square kilometres.

In 1896, prospectors found gold in a creek near Dawson City and this was the beginning of the Klondike Gold Rush.
